The novel boom and newspapers: On the newspaper novels of Early Modern Japan

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The purpose of this paper is to reveal how newspapers responded to the novel boom occurring around the year *Meiji* 20 (1887). This response can be summed up in three points:

- (1) Newspapers began actively publishing Western-style novels that they once refrained from because of this style's prior unpopularity. The novel craze brought about a changing taste for reading among the commoners who made up the majority of their subscribers.
- (2) Newspapers began to extend their aim to intellectuals, in particular students, presuming that these intellectuals would take an interest in newspaper serial novels.
- (3) Newspapers started organizing novel-writing contests as a reaction to students' desire to write novels. The novel boom enhanced the social status of novel writers and entitled more students to engage in writing novels.
